

The English Education - Safeguarding Policy

The English Education takes its responsibility for the welfare and safety of all children very seriously. Our Safeguarding guidelines and policy are based upon best practice here in the UK.

Safeguarding is the action that is taken to promote children's welfare and protect them from harm. Child protection is part of the safeguarding process. It focuses on protecting individual children who might be at risk of harm.

Prior to their engagement with The English Education all Consultants will undertake appropriate training which will include an introduction to The English Education' Safeguarding Policy Statement. All The English Education's Consultants will be required to evidence current DBS status prior to undertaking any work where they will have contact with children or young persons.

The English Education's consultants can become an important part of a child or young person's life. Over a period of time consultants can build up a strong, trusting relationship with children and their families and play a key role in providing support.

The English Education's Consultants will have varied roles. Whilst delivering agreed Consultancy or Coaching and Mentoring sessions, they will usually work with children on a one-to-one basis via online video but may, on occasion and with knowledge and permission of the Managing Director, work with children in the child's home or in a recognised workplace.

Like anyone who works with children, The English Education's Consultants have a responsibility to promote children's wellbeing. It's important they are able to recognise and respond appropriately to any concerns, and help keep children safe. It's also vital to make sure children and young people are safe during a consultancy session. This includes making sure all The English Education's Consultants have undergone the necessary checks, and steps are taken to mitigate any risks during sessions. The English Education's Consultants, parents and children need to be clear about professional boundaries and appropriate behaviour to avoid any potential misunderstandings or allegations.
